



From the Pastor's Desk

If a person approaches me, or almost any faithful priest, seeking to deepen their relationship with God, the very first advice they receive will almost always be the same: Pray every day and, of course, attend Mass every weekend. Go to confession regularly. Try to attend Mass at least once or twice during the weekdays and, if possible, spend some time in Eucharistic Adoration. We can't grow in our relationship with God if we don't spend some time with him.

So, that is my basic advice to all of you: spend more time with God. Saint Teresa of Calcutta is often quoted as having said, "If you're too busy to pray, you're too busy!" Likewise, St. Francis de Sales remarked, "Every one of us needs half an hour of prayer each day, except when we are busy—then we need an hour." I think that's good advice. We can all spare at least a few minutes in our day for prayer. If not, we need to rethink our priorities.

Having repeated this advice to you, I also want to remind you that I offer Mass and Eucharistic Adoration throughout the week, and I encourage you all to join me. Weekday Mass is often simple, quiet, peaceful, and refreshing. Come, join us!

Pray for our seminarians! The new seminarian posters and prayer cards have arrived. We currently have 27 men studying in seminaries around the world, which is good for a diocese of our size. But our diocese, and the world, always needs more young men to answer the call. I am confident that God is, in fact, calling more young

men, even from our own parishes. Unfortunately, young men are often too afraid to, or are even discouraged from, considering God's call. The priesthood is an amazing gift to the Church, and to the men upon whom God bestows it. In our parish and in our own families, we should encourage openness to God's calling to the priesthood. If you think a young man in our parish is well-suited to the priesthood, don't hesitate to tell him you think as much. If you are a young man curious about the priesthood, don't hesitate to ask me questions.

Much of the same is true, of course, of religious sisters in the life of the Church. There are countless ways that women religious have served the Church. Through prayer, through schools and hospitals they operate, and through other charitable works they do. Ask the young women you know, "Have you ever considered religious life?" Such questions can certainly plant the seeds of a vocation.

In truth, God calls every one of us to a certain vocation in life: to marriage, to priesthood, to religious, or other consecrated life. As we grow up, we should ask not "What do I want to do in life," but "What does *God* want me to do with this life he has given me?" We won't be happier in life than when we answer God's call.

I encourage everyone to **pick up a seminarian prayer card and add these men to your daily prayers.** In addition, please pray for an increase in vocations from our own families and parishes.
